During our final conversation on Election Night, November 2, 2004, Phyllis asked me, "How did the election come out?" Always interested. Always involved. Always concerned. Always invested. And always a supporter of the Cheyenne Herald.

Prove it, Safeway.
Prove you care.

On a recent trip to the Safeway store on So. Greeley, I parked a few spaces beyond the seven handicap-marked parking spaces which are in that row - on the south edge of that parking lot, and I headed toward the entrance door. A very slow moving and small lady of probably 80-85 years of age was inching her way to the same entrance. As I overtook her, I glanced sideways at her and before I could say anything, she asked, "will you help me?" I told her I'd be pleased to and offered my arm. She took it and we continued the long walk (for her) slowly to the door. I noticed that she was crying softly and as we took short steps forward, I asked her if she was all right.

She quietly said "it's so hard to walk so far" and I asked if there was an electric cart inside she could use once we got there. She knew the store very well and said there would be. It took what seemed an eternity to walk past the remaining several parking spaces (probably because I was seething inside at Safeway), which were all occupied, cross the driveway in front of the store, then get through the two sets of doors and entryway and to an available riding cart. She was a proud lady and tried to hide her crying but was unsuccessful. She was hurting. She assured me she'd be okay from there and took the seat of the electric cart and caught her breath.

Shame on you, Safeway. You should be ashamed of what you've done.
 Move more handicapped parking spaces closer in front of the Southside Safeway so they're the nearest to the entrance. Whoever designed your parking lot at that newest Safeway in town must have been drugged. To run almost all of the handicap spaces in one row, progressively further from the nearest entrance and have several other spaces in other rows closer to that entrance not be handicap parking is unconscionable.

I've heard the complaint since you opened (and, by the way, I am a regular customer there - a frequent shopper, if you will) and I've never commented here on your stupid design until now. I am not handicapped and I'd sooner walk from the G.I. Forum than park in a handicap space so this complaint is not intended to do me any good.

My good friend Phyllis Atchison used the Safeway Pharmacy when the store first opened and commented to me in her last months that it was often a long walk from her car to the door. Many of the elderly are probably headed to the pharmacy and it's located in the rear of the store. The electric carts are nice but there aren't enough of them for the number of customers who would probably appreciate the use of one.

Make 2-3 spaces nearest the two front doors in all rows handicapped parking, Safeway. And around the corner. Shame on both of us for not doing something much sooner.
